NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father
who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The filioque clause [proceeds.... and the Son] was adopted by the Roman Church in 1014 and rejected by the Orthodox Church in the Great Schism. It may be omitted "on suitable ecumenical occasions" as today, when people from Ukraine may be joining us.

We lift them up unto the Lord. Let us give thanks unto our Lord God. It is meet and right so to do. It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty, Everlasting God.

ALMIGHTY God, our heavenly Father, who of thy tender mercy didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption; who made there (by his one oblation of himself once offered) a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death, until his coming again: Hear us, O merciful Father, we most humbly beseech thee; and grant that we receiving these thy creatures of bread and wine, according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood: who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took Bread; and, when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat; this is my Body which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me. Likewise after supper he took the Cup; and, when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you and for many for the remission of sins: Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me. Why 1000 years?

In 1922, our forebears, the then parishioners of Whittlesford, celebrated the 900th anniversary of the date they took to be that of the consecration of our Parish Church – St Andrew's Day 1022. In truth, this must be regarded as a notional date, though we know there are pre-Norman stones in the church tower and chancel. The need for those Whittlesford residents to remember and celebrate was perhaps more rooted in their contemporary local and world history – as they emerged from the First World War and the Spanish 'flu pandemic, and completed a programme of major restoration of the church building.

After the Black Death of 1348/9 the village and church apparently responded by building the church porch (donated c. 1350 by Henry Ciprian). The same benefactor provided for mass to be sung at the Virgin Mary's altar (1351). In 1352, the High Altar was re-consecrated – the whole sequence of events seeming a distant, fourteenth-century echo of what took place in 1922, and what is happening now...

In 2022, we take our cue from 100 years ago, and celebrate a millennium celebrations of our church and village community. Like our forerunners, we are emerging (we hope) from a hard time, in our case the COVID-19 pandemic. We have also seen a further period of restoration of the church, which began with the opening of the Church Room in 2007 and concluded two weeks ago with the completion of the 'Raise the Roof' campaign, reusing the old lead from our church roof.
